# Cars!!?!

Many residents own cars and some have raised issues about parking. We have brought various issues about the dangers of speeding vehicles, double parking and physical or visual obstructions around junctions, particularly during the “school run” period to the police. As a result, the police have been more vigilant.



Difficulty in parking is a big issue and the cause is there are a large number of cars in the neighbourhood for the limited parking space available.



The police can and have helped relieve the problem a little in keeping as much road space as free as possible by removing untaxed vehicles from the roadside.



Drivers can help by using a bit of common sense. It may seem simple, but when parking, close the gap as much as possible between cars and don't park in the middle of a large space. More cars can then park on each street.



Remember, speeding is also an issue. Only Queens Park Parade (Harborough Road) and Kingsthorpe Grove are 30 MPH zones, all the rest of Queens Park is a 20 MPH school zone.
